6 November – Unit Remembrance March to the Argyll Commemorative Pavilion. The annual march to the pavilion is usually a solemn and intimate service. This year it was poignant with thoughts of Cpl Cirillo on the minds of all. Unit Padre Maj Rob Fead lead a service that honoured the sacrifice of all Argylls.

 1st Battalion Argylls, Killed In Action on 24 October 1944.

Saturday 8 November saw a focus on the regiment, with the Tiger-Cats hosting four of the fifteen Argylls decreed to the French Legion of Honor, as well as the Regimental Pipes and Drums, who were present to play on Tim Horton's Field. In addition, the event saw special guest BGen Patterson present, as well as nearly one hundred Argylls who were the recipients of tickets generously donated by the Tiger-Cats.

9 November – Garrison Remembrance Parade. Sunday saw the unit's participation in the annual Remembrance Day parade with the entire unit turned out and taking the lead on the conduct and organization of the parade. This year had the unique difference of being held at Liuna Park station due to the ongoing construction at Gore park. A brief service was held along with the other regiments and units within the Hamilton Garrison.

10 November - Patrol Base Cirillo Iraq.

Many gestures have been made in support of the regiment, however, on Monday, the Argylls were given a very unique honor. Fallen Argyll Cpl Nathan Cirillo was honored in Iraq by deployed Special Operations Canadian soldiers, who named a forward patrol base in honor of him. An official naming ceremony was held Monday as a part of the Remembrance Day services for serving members currently deployed as a part of the current mission against ISIS in Iraq. Operational bases are frequently named after fallen members as a reminder to those still serving, and the Argylls are honored that this consideration has been given to the Cpl Cirillo and his regiment.

10 November - "The Argyll 5" honoured by the Law Society of Upper Canada

The Commanding Officer, LCol Lawrence Hatfield attended a special presentation by the Law Society of Upper Canada. Five members of the Argylls, who served with the 19th and 173rd Battalions during the First World War, were law students at the time they went overseas, however, never returned home and therefore were never called to the bar as lawyers. On the 10th of November, the Law Society of Upper Canada posthumously called the five Argylls, as represented by members of their families, to the bar.

Multiple school visits were also held, with the Argylls speaking to audiences ranging from school children, to teenagers in high school. Schools included St Joseph's Elementary, St Francis Xavier Elementary, and the Hamilton Hebrew Academy. Our soldiers attended the school ceremonies and spoke briefly to the assembled schools about the sacrifices made by soldiers throughout Canadian history, current deployments, and the life of a soldier in the Canadian Armed Forces. Additional services were attended by members at their children's schools, and their own colleges and universities.





Cpl Ryan Weinberger made an appearance on *the Morning Show* with Tim Parent on Global TV to discuss the meaning of Remembrance Day, and to remember his friend Cpl Nathan Cirillo.

Pipe Sgt Duncan Brown also represented the Argylls the same morning by appearing on CITY-TV's *Breakfast Television* in Toronto, where he gave a brief interview before demonstrating the musical talents for which our Pipe Band is well known.

Hillfield Strathallan College, a section of Argylls supported the school's Remembrance Day services this year. This year the school dedicated a new monument in honor of school

members who served in the Canadian military. The school's list of names included several Argylls who fell in service to their country. The service was also attended by HCol Ron Foxcroft and HLCol Rick Kennedy who laid wreaths as a part of the ceremony.

US Steel Commemoration - In Hamilton, the regiment participated in the annual US Steel commemoration. A section of soldiers led by OCdt Sam Shepherd, and MCpl Mike Ash stood sentry at the US Steel cenotaph located onsite. A brief memorial service attended by members of US Steel, members of the city council, the public, and the cadets of Robert Land Academy.
